Page 2 Crosswordpuzzles are a bit like cobwebs; each response is connected to the others nearby to form a woven network of letters. Drawing on a string of letters affects all others as well. Most crossword puzzles are naturally divided into several groups of clues up and down, connected to other groups of longer responses. With that in mind, working through the puzzle a group of columns at a time -- as opposed to going through all the clues at once, followed by all the clues down -- is a good strategy. Each word you fill will help solve others around it. A clue will always be written in the same part of the speech as the answer. Check the clues that require answers that end in S, ED, EST, or ING. Often these endings can be penciled in (but not always). Checking the crossers of these responses can help verify whether the end is applied. For example, if both the above and bottom clue is plural for two responses that pass on the last letter, chances are that the letter is S. Foreign words will be flagged directly, Friend: Fr. = AMI or indirectly, Friend, in France. abbreviated are indicated directly, Whistlestop (Abbr.) = STA or indirectly with an abbreviated word as part of the clue, RR stop = STA.
